




the tee.

As Will Wiseman starts his senior year at Parkside High, he often thinks about his grandfather. Although Leland Pope, Wills grandfather, passed on over 10 years ago, his lessons of life and golf weigh heavy on Will's mind. When his grand dad introduced Will to golf at the age of five, it was an instant love. Will golfed with his grandfather all the time and learned the fundamentals of both the game and life while out on the course with his mentor. "I still do everything with thoughts of my grand dad in mind", Will says. Leland is definitely smiling down on his shining grandson.

At the age of ten, Will beat tour-pro Duffy Waldorf in a chipping contest, and won the Junior Invitational at Ocean Pines Golf Course. He then knew what he wanted to do; play as often as possible. Over the past year Will's career has really shifted into high gear. After finishing second at the Maryland State High School Championships in the 1A-2A Division and sixth overall, he started gaining momentum for his summer tour. He traveled all over the country and was able to win the Bobby Bowers Match Play Tournament, as the 11th seed, in Springfield, VA; finished 5th out of 230 at the Future Collegiate World Tour at the PGA National Resort and Spa in Palm Beach, FL; finished 2nd in the JPGA Qualifier at Shenandoah Valley Golf Club; and in the top 20 out of 224 players at the Press Thornton Future Masters Will Tournament. is currently ranked in the top 125 in the Nation (18 and under).

THE JOSHUA M. FREEMAN FOUNDATION

hosted its annual charity golf tournament on Monday, June 9. Held at Bear Trap Dunes in Ocean View, Delaware, the tournament included nearly 100 golfers and raised almost \$200,000 for the Joshua M. Freeman Center for the Arts.



"Bringing friends, colleagues, and family members together for a great day on the golf course was something that Josh looked forward to every year," stated Michelle Freeman, President and Chairman of the Joshua M. Freeman Foundation. "This tournament is not only a great way to continue doing that, but also allows us to raise money for a great cause as we work to create a permanent arts community in Sussex County."

The Joshua M. Freeman Foundation was established in 2007 to honor the legacy of Josh Freeman after his untimely death in 2006. The Foundation is dedicated to creating community facilities that support the arts, the environment, and athletic achievement.

Proceeds from the Golf Tournament will go to support the first project of the Joshua M. Freeman Foundation - the creation of the Joshua M. Freeman Center for the Arts in Fenwick Island, Delaware. The theatre was one of Josh's long-time dreams,

and plans are underway to create a center that will host large performances, and classrooms for art, dance & music.

much more. Trip information is downloaded and saved to the office computer system. Mosquito management consists of more than merely controlling the adult population, which alleviates the problem, but ignores the source.

SHOREUP! WITH THE GAME COACH

Carson Lovett, MA - Sport Psychology

When Jack Nicklaus, Wayne Gretzky and Michael Jordan speak on sports, we listen. Their expertise is invaluable becaus we learn from the best. Beyond their words, researchers have discovered a wealth of knowledge from examining th psychophysiology of the expert athlete.

Elite marksmen maintain a visual focus and a heightened level of attention ideal for measuring the activities of the brai during sport performance. The skills required for target shooting allow the athlete to be connected to an EEG that monitor brain activity without interfering with performance, providing an in-game analysis of the athlete's mental state. It was foun that expert marksmen were able to calm the left side of their brain just prior to shot execution, while no measurable effect was observed within the right hemisphere.

Given that left-brain activity is associated with verbal and analytical functioning while the right-brain is associated wit visual and spatial processing, our lesson can be applied to the links.

As we become better golfers, we rely less on mental chatter. We no longer need to talk ourselves through a shot, c question our mechanics. We gain confidence through experience, and become able to focus our attention where it i most needed.

While both Tiger Woods and I will have an active right-brain before our identical 13-footers on 17, during his approach his left-brain is quiet as he solely focuses on space and distance.

During my approach I am reviewing the steps of my routine, a mentally verbal and analytical process that increases leftbrain activity. We have a limited ability to attend to a task, so Tiger sticks it, and until I SHORE UP my game, I wonder!

PRINCESS ANNE – Like Ray Kinsella, the Iowa farmer played by Kevin Costner who obeyed the voice and built a baseball field in the movie, "Field of Dreams," 64-year old Marshall Cropper once stood at the edge of a desolate field on the edge of his beloved University of Maryland Eastern Shore campus and saw not hay, nor corn, nor soy beans, but golf.

He saw, in fact, golfers, hundreds of them, young and old, male and female, of all races, from all backgrounds of life, standing side by side, hitting irons, stroking putts, blasting out of bunkers, honing their skills at a massive, state-of-the-art practice facility that stretched as far as the eye could see.

That was his vision. And almost everyone he told of his vision laughed at him.

Now, fifteen years later, Cropper, the Director of the University of Maryland Eastern Shore Golf Academy and one of several dedicated souls who have brought the PGA of America-accredited Professional Golf Management program to the Eastern Shore, feels a sense of satisfaction on this hot July day to watch 17-year old PGM major Gregory Price hit golf balls into that same field of grass that used to grow hay.

BUILD IT AND THEY WILL COME

This story really has three beginnings. The first was in 1993 when Cropper presented his proposal to bring golf to UMES and was laughed out of the room by school leaders.

The second was in 2002, when the school's then brand-new President, Thelma Thompson, arrived on campus and dropped the bomb that she would not be building her legacy on resurrecting football, so fervently championed by the school's powerful alumni, but rather on golf.

The third will be this coming semester, Fall 2008, when UMES' inaugural Professional Golf Management class of 13 students arrives for the first time.

"When I came here in 2002, the campus inspired me," explained Thompson, whose passion for this project showed in her eyes, as much as in her words. "It was beautiful, and green. It led me to think about golf. I'm not a golfer, but I know about golf, I like the game, I understand what it can do."

Thompson began doggedly stoking a fire of enthusiasm on campus, gradually convincing administrators and faculty alike that golf, and in particular golf management, sits at the nexus of business, hotels, restaurants, athletics, and diversity of opportunity for her students.

"It didn't take me long to realize that football was a hungry alligator that would eat me up, and that golf is a milking cow that will feed me forever," she said with a fleeting, inward turn, the only indication she would give all day that the stakes are incredibly high for her and her school.

JUST HOW BIG IS BIG

"Big," said Cropper, shaking his head, when asked where this PGM program, and UMES golf in general, is headed. "Big, Big, Big."

By that he means that the PGA of America, one of the most influential bodies in the game of golf, only has 19 other accredited Professional Golf Management programs in the country, and none at a Historically Black College or University (HBCU) like UMES.

And since the PGA of America has incredibly strict guidelines for accreditation, it also means that Cropper's vision of a huge golf facility on campus will soon be a reality. Plans are already in the works, according to Billy Dillon, the Director of the UMES PGM program and a PGA Professional himself, to expand and improve the already huge driving range, then to build an 8000 square-foot putting green, an entirely separate chipping and bunker practice complex, and an indoor practice and club-building facility, including a computerized simulator and swing analyzer.

Thompson has also vowed to field and recruit male and female golfers for teams she sees competing for national titles as early as Fall 2009.

According to Dillon, 39, a native of the Eastern Shore who has spent the last 13 years as a head pro in South Carolina, of the 25,000 PGA professionals in the United States, only about 140 are minorities.

"There's a pretty obvious need there," he said. "The PGA of America is working hard to correct that, and UMES is one of their avenues to achieve that goal."

"We're excited. In this first class we expect to have 13 students, and eight of them are minorities, so it's already working. Every one of those 13 students is important to us, and to golf, and to the PGA of America. These kids are going to graduate from UMES with a background not just in golf, but also in hotels, restaurants, business and athletics." Once in a Lifetime

As dreamlike as it was for Marshall Cropper to watch young Greg Price hit balls, it was equally surreal for Price himself, if the nonplussed expression on his face was any indication. After all, just days after arriving on campus, he was already talking to media, standing side-by-side with the University President herself, posing for photos, and shaking hands.

And if ever there was a poster child for a PGM program, Price is it. Clean cut, well-spoken, confident but humble, polite to the point of absurdity, Price looked around at all the people looking back at him and said, "Sir, this is a once in a lifetime opportunity for me. This is the first HBCU to have a PGM program and I'm part of it. I'm trying to be a professional golfer. To have an opportunity like this . . . is beautiful."

Cropper agreed. "This is one of the greatest feelings I've ever had in my life. To see this young man out here hitting golf balls at UMES . . . at UMES! This is absolutely mind-boggling for me. Standing here right now, today, I know in my heart this is right. It's just right. It's all been worth it."

PRINCESS ANNE – In January of 2008, the University of Maryland Eastern Shore received accreditation through the PGA of America to offer a Professional Golf Management program to incoming students.

According to University President Thelma Thompson, the program is a combination of business, hotel and restaurant and athletic courses of study, and includes a 16-month internship, which stretches the total time for completion to approximately four and a half years.

UMES has made public the following information for prospective students in the PGM program.

Admission into the PGM program is made on a competitive basis, the criteria determined by the make up of each incoming year's class, but also governed by PGA of America guidelines, including a class limit of 100 students, and a total school limit of 400 students.

Prospective students must apply first to entrance into the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, and then after general admission may petition for admission into the Professional Golf Management program. Students may visit www.umes. edu for specific admissions procedures.

Beyond academic requirements, prospective PGM students must also produce proof of a USGA handicap of 12 or less, a "Confirmation of Playing Ability Form" filled out by a PGA Golf Professional or high school coach, and a successful completion of the PGA's Playing Ability Test (PAT).

The PGM Curriculum, according to UMES' recruitment materials, includes an orientation to the PGA and PGM field, tournament operations and rules, teaching skills, club fitting and building, turf grass management, customer relations, merchandising and inventory control, team building, management techniques, and actual playing ability.

The Professional Golf Management Student Association (PGMSA) is chartered by UMES, the Student Government Association, and sponsored by the Hotel and Restaurant Management Program. UMES PGM students are required to join the PGMSA, the fee for which is included in the yearly fee schedule.

The top two finishers in each flight will also have their pictures on the cover of the November/December holiday issue of Eastern Shore Golf Magazine, and will be featured in the articles covering the event.

The Bay Club's West Course is best known for the par-3 14th hole's island green, the so-called "Devil's Island," as well as for its monster double green which connects the difficult par-5 tandem 9th and 18th holes. It was designed by Russell Roberts and opened in 1989. From the blue tees it plays 6575 yards to a par of 72. It is rated at 71.4 and sloped at 128. Tees and fairways are Bentgrass and Rye, greens are Penlinks Bentgrass.

The East Course features the Eastern Shore's only PGA quality Zoysia grass fairways. It was designed by Charles Priestly and opened in 1999. From the blue tees it plays 6750 yards, par 72, with a 71.2 rating and a 120 slope. Tees are Bentgrass, fairways are Zoysia grass, and greens are Crenshaw Bentgrass.

BERLIN – Twenty years ago, Rob Bailey was working a construction job in Crofton, Maryland when he accepted an invitation from a buddy to kill time in the evenings by, as Bailey described it, "hanging out at this little driving range every night, hitting monster buckets of balls, like...500 balls at least."

Within the first few swings he knew he was hooked, and he spent three hours a day for the next six months teaching himself how to golf.

Already a good baseball player, Bailey started hitting golf balls lefthanded, even though he "does everything else right-handed." In the first few months he worked his way down to a 12-handicap while playing left-handed, before becoming frustrated by right-handed golfers hitting it by him.

So he switched sides.

Within a year of switching to righty, his handicap dropped to 2 and he had shot 75-77 to win the 1990 Nutter's Crossing Club Championship by three strokes.

Eighteen years later, Bailey, 43, of Salisbury, is now a PGA Class A Professional, has made a career out of golf, and is currently employed as the General Manager and Director of Golf at The Bay Club in Berlin, Maryland. He spent eight years as the Head Golf Professional at The Bay Club before moving to GM five years ago.

"A lot has happened since then, but that Nutter's Crossing Club Championship is still my favorite memory in golf," he said with a laugh.

Now as GM of a 36-hole course, he said life can be hectic, but nothing about his love for the game as changed. He stills plays once or twice a week, and competes in tournaments when he can, though he says he can't practice enough to feel really competitive. Rob and his assistant pro and friend Jarrod Goslee are undefeated in the Toyota Cup Challenge. The Toyota Cup is where each clubs Pro and Assistant play against each other.

"With two courses, we can get twice as busy as an 18-hole course pretty quickly," he explained. "On busy weekends now, we can see 500 rounds in a single day. When I started, 200 rounds a day got us excited. Now 200 feels like nothing."

Trying to keep 500 golfers a day happy requires organization, and that is Bailey's job. He oversees all golf operations, grounds, the food and beverage department, finances, budgets and inventory.

"I have a good crew," Bailey said. "That's the only way I can get it all done. I have department heads I can rely on. That makes my job a lot easier."

Bailey, who has four career holes-in-one, three right-handed and one left-handed, said he asks all of his staff to come to work in a good mood, explaining that, "No one wants to come to a golf course where the staff is walking around depressed. I tell our bag drop guys, you're the welcoming committee, you're the first impression people have of the course."

Bailey's philosophy must work, because The Bay Club has won National Golf Foundation awards for customer service and customer loyalty.

"I try to create a fun atmosphere for the employees, because I believe it will relay to the customers, and they will have a better experience."

Bailey said that these trying economic times have put pressure on resort courses like those found in Northern Worcester County, since fewer tourists mean fewer golfers. Anticipating ups and downs in the economy, he said The Bay Club has always valued its local base, and maintained a "local rate" program in which local golfers can play 18 holes with a cart for just \$35 at peak times and \$25 during twilight hours.

"It's a balancing act," he said, "trying to attract traveling golfers while maintaining your base. We use a punch card where locals who play five rounds get the sixth round free, and since that program began we've seen between 500 and 600 more local rounds every month."

A local base also pays the bills in winter, he said. "We really need local golfers on those occassional warm days."


As far as hosting the first annual Eastern Shore Golf Magazine Championships this October 25 and 26, Bailey said, "I'm excited! Green Hill Yacht and Country Club is bringing back the Salisbury Open, and now we have The Eastern Shore Golf Magazine Championships here. That's two great events for local guys. People sometimes shy away from playing their own balls in tournaments, but I know from talking to people that there are still a lot of golfers out there who really want to play in individual tournaments."

FROMTHePRO!

Want to hit longer drives? What a silly question; 99.9% of golfers are constantly looking for more distance, especially off the tee. Over the years, there have been many different methods employed to create more power, more swing speed, more ball velocity, more launch angle, less spin rate, etc., etc.. There has been the John Daly backswing, the X-Factor, the leg drive, the power slot, and the hold onto the angle, just to name a few. The one thing that I can say for science is that it has basically come to a much more simple solution: apply the power of the golf swing efficiently into the ball. What the heck does that mean? Well, it means that striking the ball squarely and with a center hit is as important, if not more important, than anything else. A golf swing does not have to be perfect to work or indeed to produce power. Each individual must make the best swing that they physically can, and they must transfer as much of that swing's power into the golf ball. This can be maximized for anyone in this three step process:

Find the perfect driver . . . not for John Daly . . . for you. Go and get fit for a driver by PGA golf professional. This does not have to cost extra. Many pros include the price of the fit in the cost of the driver. Finding the correct loft, length, head type, and shaft to max out your swing is critical. Spending a lot of money on a club is not important, finding one that works best for you is. Without a good club, a player cannot hope to make their best swing and get a good result. Where to go? The Bob Beckelman Golf Center in Berlin (Bob Beckelman – PGA), Ocean City Golf and Yacht Club (Buddy Sass - PGA), Ruddo's Golf in West Ocean City (John Ruddo – PGA), River Run Golf Course in Berlin (John Malinowski – PGA).

Learn to hit the ball in the center consistently. No matter how long it takes or how many balls you have to hit, you absolutely must become a good ball striker. Nothing kills distance more than poor contact. Practice with face tape or impact tape on the club in order to improve "centerness of hit." Knowing the location of your misses will give you the opportunity to correct them (toe, heel, low, high).

Hit the ball with a square club face. An open or closed club face is also a big killer of distance. Not only will a misaligned face add the dreaded side-spin to the ball (creating a hook or slice), but much of the power of the swing will be lost due to the glancing blow and the ball will launch either lower or higher than optimal. How do you learn to hit the ball more sauarely? Start by taking something off your swing, even if you already have a slow swing. Remember that efficiency is better than brute effort. Swing at 60% or 70% effort level and see if you can handle the timing necessary to square the club face at that speed. If you can, slowly increase your effort level until you start missing the center. Stick with the highest effort level that works and keep trying to increase it by small increments. If you are slicing (ball curving right for a right-hander), you must allow the toe of the club to pass the heel of the club more through impact. If you are hooking (ball curving to left for a right-hander), you must allow the heel to lead the toe more into impact. You must work at it to find your optimal effort level. Some players can swing at their most aggressive level and still make good square contact, some must swing at 70% or less to strike the ball well. Swing with effortless power, not powerless effort. If you have trouble with this, or any other part of your game, see your local PGA Professional.



BERLIN, MD Mike Connor, Head Golf Professional at The Bay Club in Berlin, Maryland, says he doesn't feel as much pressure as he used to over those knee-knocking sixfoot putts.

That's because on his 2001 Jamaican honeymoon he suffered food poisoning from bad Cod fish, which led to a weeklong illness and a heart attack.

That's right, a heart attack at the age of 25.

As a result, his commercial airline refused to fly him home, leading him to charter a private medical jet to carry him back to the United States.

"My poor wife," he said, laughing about it now seven years later. "She thought I was going to die. But I'm fine. It was minor and I've not suffered any permanent damage. I look at it as a good thing. Heart disease runs in my family. Now I know I have to keep an eye on it."

"And yeah, those six foot putts don't seem so important now. I learned there's a lot more to life than golf."

A 1994 graduate of Cape Henlopen High School, Connor said he declared himself pro in 1995 when he accepted a job as second assistant at King's Creek County Club in Rehoboth, Delaware.

"It was a good offer, so I declared myself a pro and got involved in the PGA of America's program to become a Class A pro," he said.

Connor explained that the PGA of America offers a pathway for professional golfers to achieve credentialing that qualifies them for jobs as teaching pros, head pros (like himself), general managers, and owners and designers of golf courses. Connor said he is a Class A1 pro, which means he is a Head Professional at a golf course, rather than say a teaching professional at a driving range, or a teacher in a collegebased Professional Golf Management program.

He said he spent seven years as an assistant pro at The Rookery before moving this year to be the Head Pro at Bay Club. "In time, I will start working towards the next level, which is a Certified Class A pro, but this is where I always strived to be. I'm happy here."

When asked what makes a good teaching pro, he said that the teacher has to be able to adapt his or her teaching style to match a particular student's learning style. "I try to keep it as simple as possible. I don't want to give people too many things to work on in one lesson. I've heard the complaint many times that people get a lesson and leave feeling overwhelmed, and as a result they never practice what they were taught."

"I also want people to know why they are making the corrections they are making, or why the ball got halfway into its flight and turned right. But I always keep it simple."

He said that the hectic life of a Head Pro does not leave much time for hobbies, but he enjoys spending time with his wife and three children, and when time does allow, to eat at one of his two favorite restaurants, "The Big Fish Grill" and "1776," both in Rehoboth Beach, DE.

When asked for one last piece of advice he offered this. "Most people don't strive to be mediocre in golf, or in any sport they take up. They want to play their best. But with that said, play to enjoy the game." Then he smiled. "Of course, you're going to enjoy the game a lot more if you're hitting greens and sinking putts."


